This is accomplished in a collaborative effort with other Local, State and/or Federal responding agencies and Private Citizens. The type of response and collaboration is determined by the type and extent of the event, each entity doing what they do best, taking the lead as their area of expertise is called upon.

This division's success over itime is demonstrated in the traditional and non-traditional relationships the agency has built and maintained with partners such as law enforcement, emergency management, fire service, DOJ, businesses, Lewis and Clark, SIUE, area hospitals, schools and various partners across the river and region since diseases know no boundaries. Other successes this year include improving our commuication system via the STARCOM radio, this radio allows for interoperable communication with other agencies at the time of the event and increasing the number of volunteers able to assist in an event to 156. These achievements and continued yearly efforts are designed toward building for a better-prepared community to withstand the public health threats here today and those coming tomorrow. 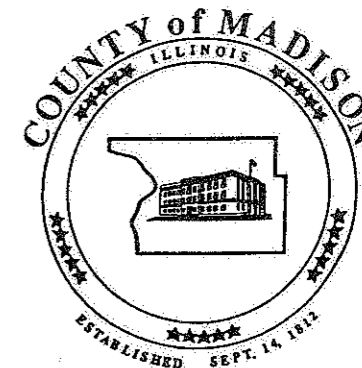

HEALTH PROMOTION SERVICES DIVISION

The goal of Health Promotion Services is to educate citizens about the positive effects of a healthy lifestyle and to encourage them to alter lifestyles through changes in behavior. Lifestyle changes are facilitated through the combination of efforts to enhance awareness, change behavior, and by creating environments that support good health practices. These lifestyle changes often require addressing physical, mental, and social issues contributing to the behavior.

Health Promotion Services administers programs with schools, community organizations, collaborations, citizens, state and regional programs, coalitions, and media. Health Promotion collaborates with many county agencies, organizations, and community members to prepare and offer education. This year the primary health promotion focus has been implementing a tobacco prevention and cessation program, assisting with youth alcohol initiatives, continuing outreach and education
